Robert Barro has been a Hoover fellow since 1995. In addition to his Hoover appointment, he is an endowed professor in Harvard University's Department of Economics, from which he received his Ph.D., as well as a research associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research. A regular viewpoint columnist for Business Week and a frequent contributor to the Wall Street Journal, he will be the next president of the Western Economic Association. He has written extensively on macroeconomic topics, especially on economic growth, public debt, and monetary policy, and is currently researching the interplay between religion and political economy. Some of his publications include Getting It Right: Markets and Choices in a Free Society (1996), Determinants of Economic Growth: A Cross-Country Empirical Study (1997), and Nothing Is Sacred: Economic Ideas for the New Millennium (2002). He is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the Econometric Society.
