A Hoover fellow since 1993, Mark Peattie is a professor emeritus in history at the University of Massachusetts, Boston. A former officer in the U.S. Foreign Service (U.S. Information Agency), Peattie holds a Ph.D. in modern Japanese history from Princeton University. He is the author, coauthor, or coeditor of eight books, including the award-winning Kaigun: Strategy, Tactics, and Technology in the Imperial Japanese Navy, 1887-1941 (1997), coauthored with the late David Evans; three volumes on Japanese imperialism, coedited with Hoover fellow Ramon Myers; and Sunburst: The Rise of Japanese Naval Air Power, 1909-1941 (2002). He is currently working on a manuscript on the Japanese experience in Southeast Asia in the twentieth century. He is also organizing an international conference on Japan's war in China, 1937-1945, to be held in 2004 and sponsored by the Asia Center at Harvard University.
