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Introduction

In the process of collecting documentary sources for the history of the twentieth century, the Hoover Institution also acquired source materials which lend themselves to the study of the Holocaust.

The present list represents a selection of the more important documentation which has been culled from the Hoover Institution Archives. The formal entries describing the materials are from the AMC (Archives and Manuscripts Control) file of RLIN (Research Libraries Information Network). The annotations stress the particular components relevant to the study of the Holocaust. materials are often embedded in larger collections such as the records of the International Military Tribunal, Nuremberg, or the collection of photoblowups from the political archives of the German Foreign Office (Germany. Auswaertiges Amt.) and their existence is not immediately apparent. Earlier antisemitic materials have also been included because they furnish a rich background of mood and attitude (German Subject collection and the Rudolf Franz collection). Special attention should be drawn to the Claremont Graduate School Oral History Programs transcripts which describe conditions for Jewish refugees in Finland during World War II. Of great interest also is the Rene de Chambrun collection dealing with Vichy attitudes and policies toward both immigrant and French Jews. The files of the United Restitution Organisation also deserve special mention since a great deal of source material on wartime conditions is hidden in the organisation's "Rundschreiben."

The extensive collections of printed and published material at the Hoover Institution Library have not been included since they can be located relatively easily through the card catalog under the appropriate subject headings.

A great deal of valuable primary documentation is also buried in the microfilms of the "Captured German Documents" of which the Hoover Institution Library holds a substantial selection. These materials are fully cataloged and can also be found through the appropriate subject headings. Further detailed guidance to these microfilms is provided by the finding aids issued by the U.S. National Archives.

The suggestion to have this list prepared was first made by Dr. Livia Rothkirchen of Yad Vashem. I am greatful to Charles Palm and his staff at the Hoover Institution Archives for the help they have given me.

Anders, Wladyslaw, 1892-1970.

Papers (in Polish), 1939-1946. 92 ms. boxes, 17 card file boxes, 1 album box.

Polish military officer; Commander-in-Chief of the Polish Armed Forces in the U.S.S.R.; Commander-in-Chief of the 2nd Polish Corps in Italy. Orders, reports, card files, questionnaires, accounts, Soviet government documents and publications, photographs, microfiche and printed matter, relating to World War II, the Polish Armed Forces in Russia, the Polish 2nd Corps in Italy, and Polish citizens arrested and deported under German and Soviet occupations, Polish foreign relations, the Polish Government-in-Exile in London, and Polish Jews.

Preliminary inventory.
Deposit, W. Anders, 1946.

Includes statements, reports, and questionnaires reflecting conditions of the Polish Jews for the period 1940-45. An alphabetical index to the questionnaires is available. It is possible to refer to document numbers in boxes 68-76 which contain the bulk of valuable sources material on the treatment and experiences of Polish Jews.

Bernfeld, Siegfried, d. 1953, collector.

Journals (in German), 1903-1919. 2 ms. boxes.

Typescripts (mimeographed and printed).

"Festschriften" of graduating German and Austrian secondary school classes, 1903-1914, and youth group journals, primarily literary, 1908-1919. Several issues are by Gerhart Eisler.

Includes special journals in celebration of the "Matura" and "Kneipzeitungen." The specifically Jewish titles are:

The specifically Jewish journals do not markedly differ in content and illustrations from the other youth journals in this collection.

Cesky svaz protifasistickych bojovniku. Ustredni rehabilitacni poradna.

Records, 1968-1972. 1 ms. box.

Rehabilitation center of organization of veterans of the Czechoslovak World War II resistance movement. Statutes, memoranda, correspondence, bulletins, and printed matter, relating to efforts to secure political rehabilitation of certain members of the resistance movement in German-occupied Czechoslovakia during World War II.

Claremont Graduate School. Oral History Program

Transcripts (photocopies), 1964-66. 1/2 ms. box.

Transcripts of oral interviews conducted by the Claremont Graduate School Oral History Program, 1964-66, relating to persecution of Jews in German-occupied Austria and Poland during World War II. Includes miscellaneous printed matter relating to anti-semitism.

Included is are account (in Yiddish) by Josejf B. Baruch dealing with American aid; an account of Dr. Simon Green relating to the experiences of an Austrian Jew, emigration to Finland and conditions in Finnish camps; interview of Dr. Joseph and Marie Rebhun describing the experiences of a Polish Jew and his survival.

These interviews are useful for graphic first-hand descriptions, evaluations of conditions and particularly for knowledge about Finnish policy toward Jews during World War II.

Chambrun, Rene, comte de, 1906-

Collection(in French) of depositions, correspondence, and printed matter, relating to conditions in France during the German occupation, 1940-44, prepared by prominent members of the Petain and Laval government. Translations of a portion of the collection are published under the title France During the German Occupation, 1940-1944 (Stanford 1958). 12 ms. boxes, 6 linear feet.

Comte Rene de Chambrun is Pierre Laval's son-in-law and has attempted together with his wife to clear Laval's name. The sections pertaining to the Jewish question are:

Entitled "Sachbericht im Mordprozess gegen den Juden David Frankfurter in Chur (Case Report in the Murder Proceedings against the Jew David Frankfurter in Chur). Berlin.

(Ms) DS135 G33G9D6

David Frankfurter had shot the Landesgruppenleiter Schweiz der NSDAP Wilhelm Gustloff in Davos in 1935. The collection contains a report of the legal proceedings against the accused in a Swiss court by Wolfgang Diewerge as well as a 32 page medical report on the accused by a Swiss psychiatrist.

Eidgenonossische Technische Hochschule

Zurich Collection, 1940-1969. 1 ms. box.

Protocols of meetings, bulletins, statutues, programs, statements, position papers, pamphlets, and printed matter, relating primarily to the Swiss organizations Eidgenossische Gemeinschaft and Gotthard-Bund, Swiss preparations for resistance to a possible German invasion during World War II, and proposals for political and social reform in Switzerland during and after the war. Consists primarily of duplicate issuances of the Eidgenossische Gemeinschaft and the Gotthard-Bund collected by the Archiv fur Zeitgeschichte of the Eidgenossische Technishce Hochschule Zurich.

Erman, Irma C.

Papers (in German and English), 1939-1978. 1/2 ms. box.

German-American author. Correspondence, writings and printed matter, relating to the history of antisemitism and to Jewish refugees from Nazi persecution. Includes two plays dramatizing the actions of Paul Grueninger, a Swiss police captain, and Mitsugi Shibata, a Japanese official in Shanghai, in saving the lives of Jewish refugees in Austria and China, respectively during World War II.

"L'Extermination des Juifs Polonais."

Memoir (in French), 1943. 1 folder.

Typescript (mimeographed copy).

Relates to the genocide carried out against the Jews in Germanoccupied Poland during World War II. Written by an anonymous Polish Jew.

Ts Poland E96

There are actually two reports in this collection. The first report was written by a young Polish Jew from Warsaw, who had been a medical student in Italy, 1937-39. He describes the ghettos of Warsaw and Lublin and the Majdanek and Belsen concentration camps after he escaped on April 15, 1943. The 24 page report was made available in Geneva on November 1, 1943.

"L'Extermination des Juifs Polonais" (cont.)

The second report contains an eyewitness account of a member of the Judenrat of the town of Kosow Huculski who escaped and composed the account (in Yiddish) in April 1943. The 21 page report was translated into French and made available in Geneva in May 1944.

Felton, Frederick L.

Excerpts from letters, 1945-46. 1 folder.

Typescript.

U.S. military attorney and member of the prosecution staff of Robert Kempner at the Nuremberg War Crime Trials. Relates to the Nuremberg trials.

Ford, Henry, 1863-1947.

Leaflet (printed in Russian), reprinting correspondence between Henry Ford, U.S. industrialist, and Theodor Fritsch, German antisemitic writer, 1927, relating to the works of Theodor Fritsch. 1 folder.

Vs Jews F699

Franz, Rudolf.

Collection (in German), 1914-1924. 3 ms. boxes.

Leaflets, proclamations, political campaign literature, war news announcements and pamphlets, relating to events of World War I, the Spartacist revolt, the Kapp Putsch in Germany, German nationalism, anti-semitism, and German and Austrian politics.

Gift, R. Franz, 1931.

Box 2, folder 1, contains some anti-semitic leaflets issued by the "Deutschvoelkischer Schutz and Trutzbund" in 1919. Box 3, folder 3, contains anti-Jewish posters issued in 1919.

Gaffney, T. St. John, 1864-1945.

Papers of T. St. John Gaffney, 1887-1941, including correspondence, manuscripts, and printed matter, relating to international relations, the World War I war guilt question, reparations, Irish independence, U.S. domestic politics and foreign policy, and the Jewish question. 3 ms. boxes.

German Subject Collection, 1873-1983. 64 ms. boxes, 1 phonorecord.

Pamphlets, leaflets, serial issues, election campaign literature, posters, other printed matter, reports, memoranda, letters, depositions, slides, and miscellany, relating to political, social and economic conditions in Germany, primarily since the German revolution of 1918, and relating especially to the Weimar period, and to post-World War II West German elections and student radicalism. In German.

Gift, various sources. Register.

German Subject Collection, 1873-1983. (cont.)

Includes the former "Berlin nach der Revolution" collection which is now in boxes 1-4. This consists of handbills, proclamations, political campaign literature, pamphlets, posters, and newspaper issues, 1918-1920, relating to the end of World War I, the Spartacist uprising, the Bavarian communist regime, the Kapp Putsch, elections of 1920, German nationalism, and anti-semitism.

Also included is the former "German Revolution, 1918-19" collection which now comprises 1 folder located in box 42. This is a collection of reports, leaflets, clippings and miscellaneous printed matter, 1919, relating to the German Revolution of 1918-19 and to anti-semitism in Germany.

Records (in German), 1923-1945. 489 ms. boxes.

Photocopies.

German Foreign Office. Correspondence, memoranda, and reports, relating to German foreign relations in the interwar period and during World War II.

Preliminary inventory.

The original records of the German Foreign Ministry are located in Bonn, West Germany, in the Political Archive of the Foreign Ministry (Das Politische Archiv des Auswaertigen Amtes). A microfilm copy of nearly complete set was made in England at Whaddon Hall. The serial numbers from this microfilming project are still used to identify the material. Users of this collection should first consult the published guide compiled and edited by George O. Kent, A Catalog of Files and Microfilms of the German Foreign Ministry Archives, 1920-1945 (Hoover Institution Press, 1969-1972), 4 volumes. This work identified the serial numbers and also provides the microfilm roll numbers for the files. A complete set of the microfilm is available at the U.S. National Archives, Washington, D.C., and copies may be purchased from this source.

The Hoover Institution Library has selected reels of the microfilm in the T-120 series which were acquired from the set at the National Archives.

The collection in the Hoover Institution Archives consists of selected photographic enlargements from the microfilm. These photo blow-ups were used by the American editors of the series <u>Documents on German Foreign Policy</u>, published by the U.S. Government Printing Office. The photo blow-ups relate to the published documents in this series and amplify them but are not identical with them.

The individual serial numbers are not complete, but offer a good research working copy. The following serial numbers deal with the Jewish question: 1125, 1495, 1512, 1881 (Judenfrage Ungarn, 1938-39), 1947, 2244, 2385 (Judenfrage Polen, 1936-1940), 2462, 2470, 2599, 2613, 2648, 2959, 2964, 3928, 7025, 7051.

Germany. Reichsfuerhrer SS- und Chef der Deutschen Polizei. SS- und Polizeifuehrer im Distrikt Galizien.

Report (in German), 1943.

Typescript (photocopy).

"Loesung der Judenfrage in Galizien" (Solution to the Jewish Question in Galicia).

This report by the SS and the Polizeifuehrer Galizien sent to his superior in Cracow on June 10, 1943 deals with the registration of Jews, the formation of forced labor camps, resettlement in ghettos, control of the typhus epidemic, etc. The report is extensively illustrated, but because it is in photostat, the photographs are badly reproduced.

The original of the report was used at the International Military Tribunal as Document L18. A translation of it can be found in the collection of the International Military Tribunal, Nuremberg, War Crimes Trials, Box 230.

Gesamtverband Deutscher Antikommunistischer Vereinigungen.

Records (in German), 1935-1944. 172 ms. boxes, 3 pamphlet boxes. Anti-communist propaganda agency of the German government. Writings, reports and clippings, relating to the international communist movement and the Jewish question.

Preliminary inventory.

This collection consists of three sections of which Section 1 is probably the most useful for this bibliography.

Section 1 consists of a clipping collection of German newspaper articles, news service reports, etc., arranged by country. Each country's collection is subdivided by topics (e.g. politics, culture, race, economics, Jewish question, anti-semitism, etc.) for the years 1935-1944. The collection is particularly extensive for Poland, Great Britain, Rumania, the Soviet Union, Germany, France, Palestine.

Section 2 consists of a set of more than 200 folders for the years 1937-1944 arranged by geographical area containing intelligence reports from diplomatic sources, monitored radio reports, as well as transcriptions of foreign newspaper articles. The sections on Germany, and particularly on Spain for the Civil War are extensive.

Section 3 consists of a set of typed or mimeographed manuscripts (in German and French) on Soviet activities for the years 1938-1944.

Glazer, Michal.

Memoranda (mimeographed), by Michal Glazer, 1937-39, relating to the international condition of Jews, especially in Poland, to prospects for creation of a Jewish state, and to the effects of British and U.S. policy on those prospects. 1/2 ms. boxes.

Grossman, Kurt Richard, 1897-1972.

Papers (in German and English), 1926-1973. 58 ms. boxes, 8

scrapbooks.

German-American author and journalist: President, German League for Human Rights, 1926-1933. Writings, correspondence, clippings, and serial issues, relating to Jewish refugees from Nazi Germany, postwar German and Austrian restitution payments to Jewish war victims to Jewish war victims, German-Israeli relations, the condition of Jews throughout the world, and civil liberties in the U.S. and Germany.

Hanover College

Collection, 1918-1977. 1 ms. box.

Pamphlets relating to national socialism in Germany, Nazi persecution of Jews, Jewish-Arab conflict regarding Palestine, Japanese participation in World War II, the Korean War, foundation of the Irish state, and other issues. Collected by the Hanover Colllege Library.

Hirschfeld, Walter, 1899-

Correspondence, 1933. 1 folder.

German physician. Relates to the expulsion of Walter Hirschfeld from the Verband der Arzte Deutschlands, in accordance with Nazi regulations, on grounds of non-Aryan descent. Includes two letters, 1941, relating to his subsequent emigration to the United States.

Institut zur Studium der Judenfrage.

Propaganda (in German), 1883-1939. 1 ms. box.

German anti-semitic propaganda, including clippings, leaflets and posters.

The first folder entitled "Deutsche Judenfeindliche Flugblaetter" contains anti-semitic propaganda from the turn of the century and also from the 1918-19 period. The other folders contain clippings from "Der Angriff," "Voelkischer Beobachter," all of an anti-semitic character for the 1930s.

International Military Tribunal. Nuremberg War Crimes Trials.

Records (in German and English), 1945-49. 75 linear feet.

Typescript (mimeographed)

Testimony and evidence, relating to the trials of alleged German war criminals at Nuremberg.

Preliminary inventory.

These records consist of the official mimeographed transcripts of the major war criminals trials from November 14, 1945 through August 13, 1946 in 24 manuscript boxes. Also available are interrogation summaries, documents books, and trial briefs of the major defendants. Of special interest is Box 230 which contains materials entitled "Persecution of the Jews," document books 1-4.

Transcripts and document books are also available for the 12 American trials as well as a substantial collection of documents of the NO, NOKW, NI, and PS series. In many cases the German originals and the English translations are at hand.

Karski, Jan, 1914-

Papers (in Polish), 1939-1944. 7 ms. boxes, 24 envelopes, 26 microfilm reels.

Liaison officer and courier of the Polish Government-in-Exile (London) to the Polish underground, 1939-1943; author Story of a Secret State (1944). Correspondence, memoranda, government and military documents, bulletins, reports, studies, clippings, newspapers, periodicals, and microfilms, relating to events and conditions in Poland during World War II, the German and Soviet occupations of Poland, treatment of Jews in Poland during the German occupation, and operations of the Polish underground movement during World War II.

Preliminary inventory. Gift, Jan Karski, 1946.

Of particular importance are 26 reels of microfilm of Polish underground publications during the German occupation as well as a set of 750 photographs, and a collection of reports, mostly in Polish.

Katz, Friedrich.

Collection (in German), 1919-1945. 173 pamphlet boxes.

Clippings, notes, and pamphlets, relating to international relations, international economic conditions, the oil industry, domestic conditions in Croatia, Croatia's role in international relations, the history and conditions of Jews throughout the world, and military operations during World War II.

Preliminary inventory.

Katz, Friedrich. (cont.)

Section IV of this collection, separated into folders 1-4, deals with the "Jewish question, 1919-1945." Most of the material consists of newspaper and magazine clippings organized by subject such as "Jews and Economics," "Jews and Freemasonry," "Jews as Criminals," as well as the "History of Jews in Europe." The worth of the material for serious research is very uneven, although a good many clippings originate from wartime newspaper files which are not easily available.

La Picirella, Joseph, 1924-

Hymne au maquis du Vercors: song, 1985. 1 phonorecord. French resistance fighter during World War II. Relates to the French resistance movement during World War II. Words and music by J. La Picirella. Sung by Michel Sande.

Laserson, Maurice, 1880-

Papers of Maurice Laserson, Russian finance, commerce and law expert, including correspondence, writings, reports, government documents, printed matter, and photographs, 1920-1949, relating to life in Russia prior to the 1917 Revolution, the persecution of Jews in Russia and their emigration to Germany, 1904-06, Soviet financial and commercial policy, 1918-1925, the purchase of 600 locomotives by the Soviet Government from Sweden, 1920, and the German socialist Karl Liebknecht. In English, French, German and Russian. 1 1/2 ms. boxes.

Loosli, C. A.

Testimony in the trial of the Schweizerischer Israelitischer Gemeindebund and the Israelitische Kultusgemeinde, Bern. Plaintiffs, vs. the Bund Nationalsozialistischer Eidgenossen, defendant, Bern, 1935. 1 reel.

This material is located in the Hoover Institution Library.

The testimony deals with the "Protocols of the Elders of Zion."

Luther, Craig W. H.

Papers, 1981-83. 1 ms. box.

American historian. Questionnaire responses and letters by veterans of the German 12th SS-Panzerdivision "Hitlerjugend" and by veterans of Canadian, British and Polish military units who fought against the 12th SS-Panzerdivision, and summaries of interviews with these veterans, relating to activities of the 12th SS-Panzerdivision in World War II, and especially during the 1944 Normandy campaign. Used as research material for the book by C. W. H. Luther, Blood and Honor: The History of the 12th SS Panzer Division "Hitler Youth," (San Jose, 1988).

McClure, Donald.

Papers, 1944-48. 2 ms. boxes.

Lieutenant Colonel, U.S. Air Force; Nuremberg war crimes trials official. Correspondence, memoranda, and trial transcripts, relating to "The Long March" of the 1st Division, U.S. Infantry, into German occupied areas following World War I; German military operations in the West during World War II; and German war crimes trials, especially the Buchenwald Concentration Camp case, 1947-48. Includes "German Military Operations Report, 1944-45," by W. H. Scheidt, Historian, Oberkommando der Wehrmacht.

Preliminary inventory.

Gift, D. McClure, 1966. Subsequent increments.

Box 1, Section B contains a set of records, documents, memoranda, and exhibits used in review of the Buchenwald Concentration Camp Case by Donald McClure. Most of the documentation deals with Ilse Koch.

Box 2 contains a bound volume of basic rules, procedures, and precedents used during German war crimes trials, reviews and appeals by Donald McClure at Dachau, Munich and Frankfurt, Germany, 1947-48.

Mora, George C., 1925-

Papers, 1943-1988. 1 folder.

American internee, Santo Tomas and Los Banos Internment Camps, Philippines, 1942-45. Diary and reminiscences, relating to conditions in the Santo Tomas and Los Banos internment camps during World War II. Includes minutes of meetings and correspondence of the Los Banos Internment Camp College class of 1947.

Nationalsozialistische Deutsche Arbeiter-Partei. Hauptarchiv. Microfilm collection of the NSDAP Hauptarchiv, 1919-1945, including materials by and about Adolf Hitler, Heinrich Himmler and Julius Streicher. Berlin, 1958.

Microfilm copy (positive) made by the Hoover Institution from the negative made at the Berlim Document Center.

155 reels, numbered 1-99, 1a-55a, and B.

This material is located in the Hoover Institution Library.

A guide to the microfilm collection is availabe, edited by Grete Heinz and Agnes F. Peterson.

In reel 24, folder nos. 496-499 deal with anti-semitism, 1939-1945, and the legal proceedings of the Talmud trial vs. Holz, Steicher and Hilz in 1929.

In reel 25, folders 500-512 deal with the older Jewish records from the 17th and 18th centuries, as well as with occasional World War II materials. Documentation on Ph. Stauff, editor of the "Semikuerchner" is also included.

Nationalsozialistische Deutsche Arbeiter-Partei. Reichspropagandaleitung.

Photographs of Jews. 3 reels.

This film strip is located in the Hoover Institution Library.

Anti-semitic propaganda (in the form of a film strip) was issued by the Nazi party.

New York (City). Department of Investigation.

Report, 1944. 1 folder.

Typescript (mimeographed copy).

Relates to causes of, and recommends measures to prevent, antisemitic vandalism and violence in New York City.

The memorandum of 169 pages was submitted by the Commission of Investigation to Mayor F. H. LaGuardia on January 5, 1944 and was based on case reports of 69 anti-semitic disturbances from September 1942 to March 1943. A nearly equal number of incidents took place from March 1943 to January 1944. The report concluded that 31 incidents were of an anti-semitic nature.

Panunzio, Constantine Maria, 1884-1964.

This folder contains the personal papers of Friedrich Riebe, born in 1901, inducted into the SS in September 1944 and became a concentration camp guard in Sachsenhausen in November 1944. According to his records, he was a butcher by trade, who had been working as an auxiliary worker in a chemical factory in May 1944. The documents are interesting for the background of a concentration camp guard. Also of interest is the poor quality of the actual paper by November 1944.

She was arrested, send to Dachau and later to a camp in Southern France. Upon liberation she stayed in France and moved from there in 1953 to Israel where she remained until her death in 1970. Her story forms chapter one of Philip Friedman's Their Brothers' Keepers (New York, 1957). Most of the correspondence is in Lithuanian and dates from the 1956-1970 period. Of greatest use is a 21 page handwritten account (in Lithuanian) on conditions in the ghetto for the 1941-44 period.
